BASIC: Includes one hour of researching local directories, member data, vertical files and other material we have available in the MGS library. This will be for ONE person, date or article.

- \$25 plus \$0.20 per page copied
- \$10 Death Certificates from 1876-1908

IN-DEPTH: Includes research of local county and city records, libraries, historical organizations, college archives, newspapers and other family history repositories (not in the MGS Library). Research will not be performed outside of the city of Mobile. Data we typically provide are vital records (birth, death, divorce and marriage), obituaries, court records (deeds, wills and administrations, orphans, etc.), residency records (census, tax records and city directories), cemetery and funeral records and Civil War information.

- \$25 per hour, plus \$.20 per page copied
- \$1 Court House records, per page copied
- \$15 Health Department records (certified); \$6 for additional copies of the same record (ordered at the same time).

Following the guidelines above, mail your research request and payment to:

Please mail a check to cover the requested research. If we cannot complete your research in the allotted time, we will contact you for instructions before proceeding further. Expect 6-8 weeks for delivery.

Your request should be as specific as possible and provide as much information as you can about the person, date or article you want (names, dates, record types and location). PRINT or TYPE your data. Include a self-addressed, stamped return envelope and include your email address and telephone number.

We are a non-profit, volunteer organization and partially rely on donations to enable us to provide the research activity. We appreciate donations if we've been able to help you in your family history quest.



DEATH OF B. F. YNIESTRA

The sad intelligence reached us yesterday of the death of B.F. Yniestra at Pensacola, on Saturday, July 12th, at 11 A.M. This will be melancholy news to the many friends Mr. Yniestra had in this place. He was long a resident of Mobile, and was identified with many organizations among us. He was wholesouled, genial and generous to a fault. When the war broke out, he went to the front with the Mobile Cadets, and was a gallant soldier in the Third Alabama. Well does the writer of this remember the pleasant days spent with him as a messmate in the entrenched camp at Norfolk. After serving some time in Virginia, Mr. Yniestra received a commission as Lieutenant in the Provisional Army of the Confederate States, and was put on duty in North Alabama. In 1864, he was appointed Major, and afterwards promoted to be Lieutenant Colonel of the Sixtysecond Alabama, a regiment composed wholly of young men that did good service at Fort Gaines, Spanish Fort, and Blakely. After the war, he was engaged in business in Mobile, till some years since, when he removed to Pensacola, where his relatives reside. Bruno Yniestra was well known among the young men of this place. He was for some years an active fireman and an officer of Merchants' No. 4. His death will be much regretted by his former associates, among whom he was greatly liked. His funeral took place at Pensacola Sunday evening.

Generation #9: George Abbot Toulmin

Evidence of Relationship to Generation #8:

1900 U.S. Census, op. cit.

1910 U.S. Census, Kosters, Mobile, Alabama, ED 70. This shows George B. Toulmin age 59 born in Alabama, as a "Sand, gravel and building materials manager"(?) with "wife Agnes H. Toulmin," age 59, born in Alabama, with "son George A. Toulmin," age 21, born in Alabama.

Toulmin Family Bible, op. cit.

George Abbot Toulmin was born in Toulminville in 1888 and graduated from Barton Academy in Mobile. He subsequently taught mathematics at Barton Academy for four years, then was named the principal of the Prichard School (northwest of Mobile). Just before World War I he was, successively. a court reporter, court secretary, and deputy clerk in the U.S. District Court in Mobile. During the war, he worked as a lofts-man laying out concrete ships at the Concrete Shipyard in Mobile. This led to an interest and expertise in concrete, and he established his own business, Toulmin Concrete Tile Company, a very successful firm.

During the Depression, and later in World War II, George Abbot Toulmin was a forester and camp director with the Alabama State Forestry Commission and Civilian Conservation Corps, superintendent of roads for Mobile County, field supervisor of the U.S. Employment Service for South Alabama, and Assistant Area Representative of the Committee for Congested Production Areas, Executive Office of the President.

In 1950, Toulmin was elected to the Mobile County Board of Revenue and Road Commissioners (essentially, the County Commission).

In 1954, Toulmin was appointed to fill a vacancy as License Commissioner of Mobile County, and he subsequently ran for and was elected numerous times to this post, until his retirement at age 81. He was so popular that he never had to spend more than \$200 on any one re-election campaign. He was Scoutmaster of Troop 25 of Toulminville, a member of the vestry at the Trinity Episcopal Church in Mobile, and a 33rd degree Mason.

Also states: "Miriam Jones (Toulmin) born at Seguin, Texas, Sept. 24, 1892," "Harry Theophilus Toulmin born at Toulminville, Alabama, August 16th, 1916, at 12 o'clock noon, The Gables."

George A. Toulmin married to Miriam Jones (no middle name):

Copy of Mobile County Alabama Probate Court original documents, Marriage Book 43, p. 81; including marriage bond of \$200, statement that there is no obstacle to the marriage, marriage license for "Geo. A. Toulmin and Miriam Jones, Maiden over 18 years of age," and certification that the marriage was solemnized, signed 28 October 1910 by Percy W. Jones, Minister (and father of the bride).

Alabama Center for Health Statistics, Baldwin County, Certificate of Death, for Miriam Jones Toulmin, born in Texas on 24 September 1892 and died 29 June 1986 at Villa Mercy, Daphne, Alabama.

Toulmin/DeNeefe Family Bible, op. cit.

Miriam Jones (1892-1986) was born in Seguin, Texas, the daughter of Reverend Percy Walton Jones, a learned Episcopal minister who could read and write Hebrew, Greek and Latin. Miriam's mother was Percy's first cousin, and hence was Ann Walton Jones Jones. (!) Miriam attended schools in Toulminville and Mobile, including Barton Academy. She married George Abbot Toulmin at the Trinity Episcopal Church in Mobile.

Miriam Jones Toulmin was an early advocate of women's rights and became the first president of the League of Women Voters of Toulminville. She held numerous offices in the Toulminville Civic Club,

School Improvement Association, PTA, and American War Mothers. During World War II she worked for the Alabama State Employment Service and the Mobile Air Service Command at Brookley Field.

After the war, Miriam Toulmin managed various apartments that she owned, and became proficient in plumbing and other building trades. She drove to check on her apartments in a miniature Crosley roadster, a rather remarkable sight in Toulminville and



Mobile. She died at age 94.

Toulmin (born in Alabama) and Miriam J. Toulmin (born in Texas) with son Harry C. Toulmin (should be Harry T. Toulmin) born in Alabama, age 13.

Mobile Register, 12 June 2002, obituary. This shows "Harry Theophilus Toulmin, age 85, died Monday, June 10, 2002... survived by his wife Mary Morgan Duggar Toulmin of Fairhope, his son, Llewellyn Morgan Toulmin and his wife Susan Little Toulmin....was the son of the former County Commissioner and License Commissioner George Abbot Toulmin and his wife Miriam Jones Toulmin."

Toulmin/DeNeefe Family Bible, op. cit.

Harry Theophilus Toulmin was born at "The Gables" in Toulminville in 1916 and was named for his great-grand uncle, Judge Harry Theophilus Toulmin, who had served

as the Colonel of the 22nd Alabama Infantry during the Civil War, fought at Shiloh, Murfreesboro, Chickamauga and Atlanta, and had died a respected federal judge in 1916, the year young Harry was born.

Young Harry attended Gorgas and Murphy High Schools in Mobile, and later graduated from the University of Alabama with a B.A. in political science and public administration. He worked for the Interstate Commerce Commission, National Youth Administration and, early in World War II, the Office of Price Administration. He served in the U.S. Army for three years during the war, first as an enlisted man and later as a lieutenant. For part of the war he was stationed on the French island of New Caledonia in the South Pacific. Everyone else in his division of 15,000 men received orders to go to the deadly jungles of New Guinea, but his orders were lost, and he remained in New Caledonia, unit-less and order-less, for several months, requesting orders. Finally, he applied for Officer Candidate School back in the U.S., was accepted, and served out the war as an infantry training officer, with the rank of Lieutenant. (As a result of his WWII service on the French possession of New Caledonia, west of the International Date Line, he and his descendants are eligible for membership in the lineage societies of the Order of World War II, the Order of Lafayette, and the Military Order of the Carabao.)

After the war, Harry joined the non-profit

consultancy Public Administration Service, and he undertook personnel and budget analysis assignments in the U.S. for 35 different local and state governments. He was hired as the Budget Director for the new Metro Dade County, Florida, a consolidated county-city government which was quite controversial and which he had helped to promote and create. In just a year as Budget Director he re-organized 35 different county units with 6500 employees, and saved enough funds that he was able to deliver a substantial tax reduction in the county millage rate.

Toulmin returned to Public Administration Service in 1959 and was assigned to clean up the financial administration of the dictator Papa Doc Duvalier in Haiti, under a contract with the U.S. Agency for International Development (USAID). But, since Duvalier's regime was immensely corrupt, the dictator was worshipped as a voodoo demi-god by a large part of the population, and was propped up by his infamous and violent militia, the Tonton Macoutes. This was too big a job even for USAID and Harry, and he was pulled out after just three months of a two year contract. He and his family were sent instead to Thailand. There Harry had much more success, and spent five years setting up the first Bureau of the Budget (the equivalent of the U.S. Office of Management and Budget) for the Royal Thai Government, working from an office

in the King's Royal Palace. He subsequently undertook shorter budget and personnel assignments for USAID and the World Bank in Newfoundland, South Vietnam (during the Vietnam war), the Philippines, Sri Lanka, Ethiopia, Kenya and Turkey.

Returning to the U.S., Harry worked on public administration reform projects in Atlanta, Minnesota, Birmingham, Alabama, and elsewhere. After his retirement, he wrote an autobiography (A Life's Memoir) and the two previously mentioned books on Toulmin and Toulminville history (Geo. B. Toulmin Says and The Great Bingville Fair). He also published the comprehensive A Catalogue of Toulmins, written by English cousin George H. Toulmin. Harry and Mary lived first in Daphne, Alabama next to the Bayside Academy, then moved to Homestead Village in Fairhope.

Mary Morgan Duggar was born in Mobile on 12 August 1919, the second child of Llewellyn Ludwig Duggar, M.D. and Ida Flora Morgan. She attended Murphy High School in Mobile and evinced an early interest in theater, speech and public issues. She received a B.A. in speech and



drama from the University of Alabama. Her thesis, later expanded into an 800-page opus, was on the history of the theater in Mobile from 1808 to 1861. During World War II she worked as a personnel classification analyst at Brookley Field in Mobile, and later worked in radio.

After Harry joined the Public Administration Service, his assignments around the U.S. were rarely more than three months long, so Mary became adept at living out of her car trunk as she (and son Llewellyn) tagged along. In Thailand, Harry's title was PAS Chief of Party, but Mary was the real "chief of party," since she had to formally entertain Thai, American and foreign dignitaries and colleagues at least once a week for five and a half years. Having servants (driver, cook, wash amah, handyman, gardener and guard) helped, but sometimes created more management problems than actual production.

After the family returned to the U.S. and stayed in Atlanta for several years, Mary attended library school at Emory University and received her Master of Library Science in 1967. She subsequently worked for the Mobile Public Library as a reference, extension and audiovisual librarian, retiring in 1980.

Mary was a leading member of the League of Women Voters in Florida and Alabama. In Baldwin County she attended virtually every County Commission meeting, as the official LWV observer, for sixteen years.

After several years, new commissioners came to her for training and advice, and when she finally surrendered her post, she was given a commendation for public service by the Baldwin County Commission.

Both Mary and Harry were very active in the Fairhope Unitarian Fellowship. Both, like their parents before them, were active in genealogical research. Mary was a member of the Society of the Lees of Virginia, for proven descendants of Richard Lee, the 1639 immigrant to early Jamestowne. Mary Morgan Duggar died on 25 December 2003 in Daphne, Baldwin County, Alabama.



AGED MAN REMAINS ON DESK ALL NIGHT

Oscar G. Guesnard Emerges None The Worse for Experience

After remaining on the top of desks in the office of the Foreman & Meador Real Estate Company from noon Wednesday until 6 o'clock Thursday morning. Mr. Oscar G. Guesnard, 83 years of age, a clerk for the Brick and Coal Company, is as well as ever and was seen on the streets Thursday afternoon.

In attempting to reach his home, at 409 South Jefferson street, Mr. Guesnard reached the office of Foreman & Meador and was forced to remain there on account of the height of the water. As the water rose he climbed on the top of office desks and was discovered there at 6 o'clock thursday morning when employees went down to the office. He was exhausted and was carried home, but soon recovered and was out again in the afternoon.

Destruction by the Hurricane of 1916

Early on the morning of July 3, 1916, The Mobile Register ran a story about the first hurricane of the year. The U.S. Weather Bureau central office in Washington had sent a telegram to weather offices along the Gulf Coast the day before. The message had warned of a tropical cyclone near latitude 17N, longitude 84W, or north of Swan Island. It was moving north or northwest.

On July 4th, the weather in Mobile was ordinary. There was a thunderstorm around three in the afternoon, but the barometer was slowly falling, telling of the approaching storm. Vessels were advised to remain in port, but most of the steamers and tugs were at rest anyway, because of the Independence Day holiday. There was talk about the storm in the Gulf, but no one took it very seriously.

After all, early season storms were generally not very bad. At 9:13 p.m., a storm warning arrived by telegraph and it was immediately disseminated.

The storm headlined the Mobile Register the next morning. The barometer had begun a free fall and the wind started to pick up by 4:30 a.m. at 4:55 a.m., winds were averaging 36 mph. By 10:07 a.m., they were running 44 mph. By noon, the wind was 60 mph. They would peak at 106 mph.

The tide that morning had actually been below normal, but it began to rise during the morning. At 11 a.m., Mobile's Chief of Police was dispatched to warn businesses along the riverfront that a significant storm tide was expected. Around 4:45 p.m., the water rose over the St. Francis Street Wharf. The

storm was at its peak. The barometer had fallen to 28.92 inches at 3:45 p.m. The surge quickly inundated Water Street. Eventually, areas four blocks from the riverfront would be under water. The 11.6 foot surge height still is the record for Mobile. Hurricane Katrina came close at 11.46 feet at the Alabama State Docks.

The barometer at Fort Morgan dropped to 28.38 inches. At Pascagoula, the station was in the eye for 20 minutes between 4 and 5 p.m. Mobile picked up 8.56 inches of rain. At Pensacola, winds caused much of the destruction with a lower storm surge. The damage was heavy along the coast, totaling \$3 million. Four people lost their lives in the July 1916 hurricane.

The dying tropical cyclone would

become famous for record setting rainfalls well inland when the storm stalled over the South, including here in Birmingham, where 8.84 inches fell on July 8th. Another tropical system later in the month led to the Magic City's record monthly rainfall as 20.16 inches fell, a record to this day.

A second strong hurricane would affect the Central Gulf Coast in October, hitting the Pensacola and Mobile areas hard again with even stronger winds, but less storm surge because of a faster forward movement.

MONROE PARK IS FLAYED BY STORM; YACHT CLUB GOES

Mobile's Playground Loses Many Fine Shade Trees and Some of Amusement Buildings.

YACHTING HOME AND PIER CARRIED AWAY BY STORM.

Long Bridge of Cedar Point Road May Have To Be Rebuilt. Trees Block Highway

Monroe Park, the bayside pleasure resort of Mobile, is in a state of desolation. Where only a few hours ago stood many fine trees and numerous structures for amusement purposes, the storm has left its mark. The old theater building, where amusement companies were wont to give summer night performances, and recently converted into a dancing pavilion; the roller coaster, which was a thriller to those enjoying the ride around the circuit; the shooting gallery and a number of other buildings were leveled to the ground.

Waves Claim Part of Playground.

So fierce was the force of the waves that beat over the breakwater in front of Monroe Park, that they whipped a large slice of the playground proper for a distance of about thirty feet back from the road. A number of fine shade trees in the ground were blown over.

The grand stand of the Southern League baseball park, adjoining Monroe Park, is down and the fence levelled to the ground.

The two-story home of the Mobile Yacht Club, together with its long pier, located a third of a mile out from the roadway, was swept clean off the pilings and nothing but these were to be seen yesterday. The long pier, just east of the pier leading to the Yacht club house, also went away under the force of the wind and waves.

Three members of the Yacht Club and two negro employes remained in the house until about 3 o'clock Wednesday afternoon, when they decided it would be unsafe to stay longer.

Clubmen Crawl Along Pier.

They had to crawl along the pier to avoid being blown away. When they were leaving the clubhouse the pier was rapidly going to pieces. Shortly after they had reacted and they noticed the building was also going by degrees.

People residing along the bay front in the neighborhood of Monroe Park stated that the water was higher than they had ever known it

and that it beat with much greater force. Some expressed surprise that everything along the bay front had not been demolished. The front road was badly damaged, as was also Cedar Point road near the long bridge, which was also damaged to the extent that it will have to be rebuilt.

On Cedar Point road great trees were down across the road so badly that it was with difficulty that pedestrians could make any headway. It was impossible for automobiles or other vehicles to get any distance away from the city.

NO ONE NEED BE IN DISTRESS, SAYS MAYOR PAT LYONS

Immediate Steps Will be Taken
To Relieve Every Case of Destitution Reported.

POLICING BUSINESS AREAS IS FIRST CONSIDERATION

Work of Cleaning Up City Will Begin at Once and Pushed as Speedily as Possible.

"If any cases of destitution or distress are reported to me I will take immediate steps to investigate and if found worthy, will see that such cases are given immediate attention."

Such was the statement of Mayor P.J. Lyons yesterday when asked what steps had been taken towawrd relief work in the city.

Deserving Will Be Assisted.

"The city has suffered considerably from the storm," said the mayor, "and we are taking steps to straighten out the tangle as rapidly as possible. It is the duty of the city to render assistance to the deserving, and it will be done.

Mayor Lyons stated that the first thing he had given attention to was policing the business section of the city because of the absence of lights. As to cleaning-up work, he said that this would begin at once and be pushed with as much speed and expedition as possible.

TWO SIDES

A storm has two sides to it, like everything in this world. It puts a great many people to expenses for making repairs, alterations, moving and rebuilding, but it gives a great many people work to do, and it places a lot of money in circulation. The fact that contractors are advertising for carpenters, bricklayers and masons is the sign of the great activity that the storm has occasioned. What is more, the money expended will get about in all the channels of trade and there will be better business than is usually had at the mid-summer season. We do not say that storm damage is a good thing, but certainly it is not an unmitigated evil.

MOBILE AND THE STORM

We dare say that if such a storm as that of last Wednesday had centered on any seaport other than this one, it would have made a big record in damage to property and destruction of life. The wind was the fiercest ever measured on this Southern coast and its duration the most prolonged. The great storm that nearly ruined Galveston and was the cause of 4,000 deaths in that city in 1900 had a wind velocity not much over 90 miles an hour at the maximum, and an average under 80; and it lasted one night. The second Galveston storm might have been as destructive but a great sea wall was ready in 1901 to fight off the mighty waves from the gulf. The wind registered as high as 70 miles an hour at one time.

In last week's hurricane here the wind averaged 85 miles an hour and there were twenty hours of it; one time the velocity being 107 miles an hour.

The explanation is found in Mobile's protected situation, 33 miles from the sea. It is the wind principally that Mobile has to contend with. Only along the riverfront, and in the streets near the river, the backwater, driven by the force of the wind plays a part in doing damage.

A score of times has Mobile been visited during its history as a city, although never with such severity as in this latest occasion; and the record has been in all cases the same.

People outside are always alarmed when they read that the hurricane has come, that the wires are down and Mobile is shut off from the world. Newspapers have been known to print in red ink and largest letters "Mobile wiped off the map!" - but it has never happened, and if we judge by what has been experienced in the past, it will never happen. Mobile is the most comfortable place we know of in which to have an attack of hurricanes.

Death Notices 1890 A-J The Mobile Daily Register

This death notices index from 1890 is a listing of names transcribed from the newspaper column "Vital Statistics," which was published every Sunday in Mobile's *The Daily Register*, with the subtitle "Marriages, Births and Deaths of the Week." The original microfilmed pages had already been abstracted by Ann Torrans Summersell to create the MGS publications, *Birth Notices – Mobile Daily Register, Volume I: 1885-1889, Volume II: 1890-1899 and Volume III: 1900-1909.* We hope to publish a companion series of Death Notices as a larger project to cover the same time period, 1885 through 1909.

Information used for the death notices was originally gathered from the office of the Mobile Board of Health during the previous week, but are not legal records. The notices included only the individual's name and race. Additional fragmentary information could sometimes be found in earlier years, but by 1890, the list only gave only name, race, and whether the deceased was an infant. In that case, the original listing was "infant of" followed by the names of the mother or both parents. The names, which originally appeared in chronological order by date of death, have been sorted alphabetically for the purpose of this series.

Every effort has been made to avoid transcription errors and the names are spelled exactly as they appeared in the paper. We have not used [sic] to indicate unusual spellings, but have transcribed all names exactly as they originally appeared. Legibility was affected in some cases by the quality of the original microfilm.

OBITUARY OF LEWIS MORRIS

DEATH has already invaded the Fairhope circle.

Bro. Lewis Morris of Palatka, Fla., whose application for membership was filed June 9th, died on July 26th. He had been spending the summer at Eureka Springs, Ark. and Liberal, Mo., the last communication from him being dated at Liberal on July 11th only two weeks before the date of his death. What was the cause of his sudden taking away and whether or not he was able to reach home before the end came we do not know. Only the bare announcement of his death has been received.

The writer had looked forward with pleasant anticipation to the time when he might meet Bro. Morris face to face for his letters bore abundant evidence of a mind and disposition which would have made him a valued member of our community.

Born in 1821, he was, therefore, past the allotted mark of three score years and ten; an age at which few men -- however much in sympathy with a work like ours - would be expected to join actively in establishing it. Something of the hope

that actuated him in becoming one of us may be gathered from the following words which accompanied his application. "So far as I have any selfish motives in wishing to unite with you they are solely that I may place the little worldly wealth that I possess under the control of a wiser management than my own, to the end that it may do the most good where it is most needed, and that in my declining years I may be able to enjoy the association of men and women of both brains and altruistic sentiments." In his last letter, he expressed great interest in the matter of location and forwarded some information which he thought might be of value.

He had hoped to be among the first to settle in the colony and took the keenest interest in every step toward the goal of its successful establishment.

Though personally a stranger to all of us there is a bond of sympathy springing from a common hope and purpose and that as noble and lofty a one as can animate the human mind, that will make each of us feel a sense of personal loss.

The History of Monterey Street

By Jay Higginbotham, 60 Monterey Street, North

Monterey North, stretching from
Dauphin Street to Old Shell Road, was first
opened as an extension of Old Monterey
Street in 1907. Originally part of an
eighteenth century Spanish tract, the site
was purchased from Spain by **Antonio Espejo** in 1804. Totaling some 800 arpents
and stretching south from Three-Mile Creek
to Government Street, the Espejo lands lay

just inside Mobile's western city limits.

During the war of 1812, **Andrew Jackson** attacked Spanish troops and drove them from the town. Antonio Espejo, the Spanish royal baker in Mobile, was by this time deceased, but his family retained ownership of his land. In 1826, however, the Espejo tract was subdivided and a large part was sold to Philadelphia native **Edward Hall**,

who later built a red-bricked mansion near the present site of 58 Monterey North. Hall, who served as Mayor of Mobile in the 1840's, died in 1867, and his home and property were bequeathed to his son, William Hall, who died in 1904. William's wife, Ruth, then sold the tract, known as Hall Place (which extended from Catherine Street to Terrace Place and from Old Shell Road to Dauphin Street) to George Fearn & Son's Realty Investment Company for \$17,000. After nearly two years, Fearn secured clear title to Hall Place and immediately began work on one of Mobile's first planned subdivisions. North Monterey Street was opened in 1907

and several houses underwent construction. By the end of 1908, these homes and several others were completed, and by the following year the majority of the 35 lots were home sites. By the end of 1909, North Monterey was a thriving young street.

A year or so later, Fearnway and Terrace Place (now Reed Avenue) came into their own, with a number of stately homes being built. In September 1908, the Mobile Register had reported that "Hall Place is one of the prettiest tracts within the new city limits." Monterey Street at this point was made of dirt and would not be paved for another ten years, but live oaks (two of

which still remain) were planted down the center of the concourse, and sidewalks and other ground improvements were made with the city's full cooperation.

Largely of wood-framed construction in the styles of colonial revival, by Mobile architects **Archibald McCrary, Aloysius Downey, Edward Slater** and **William Penham**, the houses sold for between \$5,000 and \$10,000.

In its hundred-year history Monterey North's homes were purchased by numerous well-known Mobile families. In addition to **Peter Hamilton, Walter Bellingrath** and **Bart Chamberlain**, Monterey North homeowners, over the years, have been the families of Chandler, Van Antwerp, Shearer, Morrissette, Byrne, Haas, Laubenthal, Cook, Gardberg, Luce, Laurendine, Whiting, Greenwood, and of course many others.

During the 1920's, Hall Place (consisting of North Monterey, Reed Ave., and Fearnway) became a very stable neighborhood composed of long-staying residents. One family (**the McDonalds**) has been on the street since the very beginning. During the Great Depression things began to change. More families began selling and moving, and during the decade of World

War II, as Mobile was flooded with new residents, many rental units were added to the neighborhood. In the 1960's an increase in crime in downtown Mobile, and the rising violence of the Civil Rights era, led many residents to begin selling out and moving to the suburbs. The situation reached a low point in 1973 when, at one point, six of the 34 houses were up for sale and the dictum was often voiced "Go west, old folks – beyond the Beltline!"

The lowered prices of the houses, however, presented an opportunity for younger people to acquire some elegant homes if they were willing to repair them. As it turned out, they were willing to repair them and the street underwent a transition in the 1970's that turned the neighborhood back to its glory days of the 1920's. In 1973, energetic residents formed the Monterey North Street Association in an effort to revitalize the area. In 1975, the Historic Mobile Preservation Society honored the group with the first architectural award ever bestowed on an entire residential district.

In the year previous, the new association met and planned a Monterey Street Party which has continued every year to the present day and which has become one of Mobile's favorite gatherings, hosting several

thousand guests during the early days of May. Other activities are organized by the street throughout the year, including Halloween parties, Christmas candle lightings and other social and charity events.

A few years after the Monterey North Association catalyzed a neighborhood restoration, Monterey Street received its hardest hit in the form of Hurricane Frederic (in September, 1979). Although the street had been damaged by the hurricanes of 1916, 1926, 1936 and 1947, Frederic caused more damage than any previous storm. Still, although the damage to roofs and trees was considerable, it did not compare with the destruction to Spring Hill, Dog River or Delwood where the loss of trees was devastating. Monterey North, 30 feet above sea level and not subject to flooding, lost only three major trees. Unfortunately, one casualty was the live oak at No. 68, one of the oldest in Mobile.

Hurricane Frederic, as unwelcome as it was, brought the community even closer together with front porch and backyard get-togethers during a full week without electrical power. Since that time even more effort has been put into improving the street

and more houses have been placed on the National Register of Historic Homes. At present, 22 of the 34 houses of Monterey North have made the register and many of the remainder are eligible.

In the meantime, Monterey North, as part of the Old Dauphin Way Historical District, continues to improve and has been the subject of a number of articles in area newspapers and magazines, including *Southern Living*.

Editor's note: In the book Southerners at War - The 38th Alabama Infantry Volunteers,

by Arthur E. Green, Mr. Green indicates that Dauphin and Monterey streets were once the location of Camp Holt, home to the 1000 men of the 38th Infantry.

Mr. Green states, "They were part of General Henry D. Clayton's Brigade and were transferred from Mobile to Tullahoma, Tennessee, in the spring of 1863 and became part of the Confederate Army of Tennessee." "The men came from Clarke, Monroe, Wilcox, Choctaw, Fayette, Conecuh, Coosa, Dallas, Baldwin and Mobile counties. The

38th Alabama was at Mobile from the spring of 1862 until spring of 1863. They were primarily at Camp Holt on Dauphin Way, our Dauphin Street of today, a few miles west of downtown, near Monterey and Dauphin Streets."

The 38th was among the troops surrendered at Citronelle, Alabama, on May 4, 1865. Of the 830 men of the 38th, who left Mobile in spring of 1863, there were 80 men left.

MOBILE COUNTY COURTHOUSE BURNED

THE COURT HOUSE BURNED -- A fire was discovered at about 20 minutes of 10 o'clock this morning in the southwest corner of the attic loft of the Court House. Water was conveyed to it as soon as the engines could be got to work; but owing to the great height, and the access to the loft being directly at the spot where the fire broke out, the flames soon spread to the entire roof of the rear of the building, the destruction of which involved that of the second story.

The lower story being fire proof, and the front and rear above being separated, to the roof, by a (supposed) fire-proof wall, it was believed that the progress of the fire was stopped with the burning of the second story rear, but at about ¼ of 12 the whole remaining roof burst out in flames, and nothing can escape but the first story.

The county records are all secure in the fire-proof rooms below, and the valuable

contents of the story above were confined to the library, all of which, we believe, was saved. The men of the marine corps, working under their officers, were very efficient in saving the library.

The falling of the rear cornice overthrew the kitchen chimney of the City Hotel, damaging the roof, and afterwards the falling of the southwest cornice broke in the roof of the rear wing of Mr. Forsyth's residence, which, as we write, is in further danger when the northeast cornice falls.

The fire is, of course, a piece of incendiarism, and must have been set this morning, after the building was open. No facts are yet developed on which to base a theory of its object; but the natural explanation, without seeking further, is, that it is merely a part of the Yankee system for the gradual destruction of our city – that being a cheaper plan than the one they are practicing with

so little progress at Charleston. Their perseverance will probably be rewarded with success, for we have not heard of an arrest on suspicion of incendiarism in three years. Indeed, from the patience with which these frequent conflagrations are submitted to, the enemy might readily believe that we rather like them than otherwise – [News. Since the publication of the foregoing, we learn that there are some reasons for supporting that the fire took from a defective flue.]

THE COUNTY RECORDS – When the fire took place yesterday at the Courthouse, Mr. William Gibbons, Fire Warden of Number 7, took charge of the county records until the arrival of Judge Bond who was detained on business elsewhere. On his arrival he was in favor of locking the doors and leaving everything as it was, but was overruled by other authorities who were apprehensive that the wall might fall in and the vaults be crushed by them. The services of the marines, and of the government wagons being offered, he reluctantly consented

to their removal, but manifested his faith in the security of his office by leaving his private papers undisturbed. The records were removed under the superintendence of Mr. Gibbons, and taken in charge by Capt. J. S. Whitney, of the Police.

After the fire was over, the safety of the walls being demonstrated, they were carried back, and we are requested by Judge Bond to say that they are now again safe in their legal place of deposit, where he will be prepared to-morrow to attend to business as usual.

Much credit is due to Mr. Gibbons for his attention to this matter. He firmly resisted all attempts to interfere with his charge until Judge Bond, the legal custodian of the records, reached the ground, and in the work of removal was equally strict in preventing access to any but authorized persons.—Capt. Whitney, too, kept vigilant watch and ward over them until they were carried back.

A portion of the papers having been mixed up with other documents have not yet been returned, and Judge Bond asks

Monday, February 2, 1864

THE COURTHOUSE. – We regret to learn that our information of the condition of the first story of the Courthouse was premature. Yesterday morning large fissures were discovered in the vaults, some of which had opened since the previous day. The Probate Court records were removed to the Aldermen's room, which was promptly tendered by His Honor the Mayor for that purpose, and Judge Bond's office will, for the present, be established there. We have not yet been informed of the temporary location of the other offices.

Editor's Note:

While transcribing the Mayor's Court reports for 1864, Michelle Woodham came across these reports regarding a fire at the Mobile County Courthouse and the efforts to protect the county records. Her words to me were, "Thanks to these people for saving the records! There were so many burned courthouses across the south... many were set by the Northern soldiers, but some were caused by other sources."

I would like to add that the people cited in these articles were the predecessors of so many other dedicated archivists and public records employees through the years. We especially miss our dear friend and colleague, the late Coll'ette King, who knew every shelf that held historical records at Mobile County Probate Court and who shared her encyclopedic knowledge with every researcher who came to her desk.

Though warned by Recorder Edington that further trouble created by her in the neighborhood of Savannah and Charles streets would result in her incarceration for a term, Mrs. Anna Belle Ransier announced to the court that if her husband did not provide for herself and children she would "cause trouble and serve her time."

The woman was arrested on complaint of residents in the neighborhood mentioned. Arresting officers testified that when they found the woman she had a double-barrel shotgun on her shoulder and was threatening to shoot her husband. Two small children were brought to prison with Mrs. Ransier and in order that she might return to her home and properly attend to her babies the recorder entered a discharge.

MORTUARY Mr. John Hall

Information reached Mobile of the death of Mr. John Hall in St. Louis, last week. Death came through an illness lasting through December: Mr. Hall was well known in Mobile and also in Baldwin county.

During his early married life he resided in Jacksonville, Florida. He became a traveling salesman out of Mobile for the Simmons Hardware Company. From 1892 to 1895 he was connected with the Partridge Hardware Company of this city.

Out of the hundreds of employes of the Simmons Hardware Company of St. Louis, the largest hardware concern in the United States and possibly the largest hardware concern in the world, he was selected to go into foreign lands in order to establish, if possible, connections there for the sale of the Simmons Hardware Company goods. In the course of that duty he not only went through European countries, including Russia, but also to Argentina, Peru, Australia and New Zealand, among other foreign countries.

His serious nature demonstrated itself in his early studies for the ministry of the Episcopal Church. Reasons of health or circumstances diverted him into other channels but the disposition which influenced him to turn his thoughts first to the ministry remained with him during life and finally blossomed in the functions of becoming a teacher of businessmen.

It was his wish that his remains should be laid beside those of his father and his family, and on January 6 they were placed to rest at Carpenter's Station in the family burying ground of the Halls, Rev. Dr. Palmer of the Episcopal Church of Bay Minette, officiating.

The ill health of his devoted wife, who lives in Tucson, Arizona, prevented her being present.
