## Super Location, Beautiful Building, in a Gorgeous Town

## University Club of Santa Barbara

My wife and I visited the University Club of Santa Barbara (UCSB) and had lunch and a tour in July 2017.

**HISTORY AND THE BUILDING:** The club was founded in 1919 by a group of eleven men, all with university degrees. They originally rented a small house, but then in 1923 bought what was called "Calkin's Castle" for \$30,000. This was a beautiful private estate built in the Spanish style in 1880. Bi-weekly dinners were held, costing only \$1.25 per person.



Originally for men only, the club had several "bachelor rooms" upstairs that rented for \$80 per month, including three meals per day. These rooms are now staff offices, with four offices rented out to members for business use. The club now has many women members.

The UCSB is an excellent location, just two blocks from the Courthouse (one of the most beautiful in the country), backing onto Alice Keck Park, and near State Street, the main shopping area. Of course Santa Barbara is a lovely town, with many attractions and a

unified, consistent Spanish Colonial Revival architecture, which came about when the Moorish Revival town center was levelled in a violent 1925 earthquake.

**FACILITIES:** The club facilities and activities include meeting rooms, dining rooms, patio and outdoor dining, a large lawn for outdoor events (no tents ever needed or used, given the excellent climate!), billiards/pool, a speakers' series, book club, wine tastings, and a remarkably large list of 320 reciprocal clubs.

The club is usually open from 9am to 5 pm, with an honor bar available to members after closing.

Parking is free when dining at the club. High speed Internet access is available throughout the facility. Staffers were very helpful, friendly and knowledgeable.



There is no overnight accommodation, but UCSB has a substantial discount arrangement with the nearby boutique Upham Hotel, which is a very attractive facility (where we stayed for three days and were quite pleased). This hotel discount is available to reciprocal members. There is no gym, but membership in the UCSB allows for joining the Santa Barbara Athletic Club with no initiation fee.




**FOOD:** The club is oriented toward weekdays-only dining, since weekends are usually devoted to weddings. Lunch is served Monday to Friday from 11:30 to 2:00 pm, with dinner only served on Fridays, often with a different gourmet theme. All diners sit down

and begin eating at the same time on Fridays. Free wine and beer are offered during the Friday lunch. Breakfast is offered on Thursdays only, and this is a complimentary continental breakfast.

Our lunch included an excellent burger (an "A"), chicken picatta over noodles ("A-"), and some local McConnell's ice cream ("B+"). Prices were a bit higher than at the rival Santa Barbara Club, with UCSB charging about \$12-17 for main dishes.

**RULES:** The dress code requires a coat but not tie for men at dinner, and business casual dress at lunch. Torn jeans, T-shirts, and shorts are never allowed.



**MEMBERSHIP:** Members are drawn from local businesspersons, real estate brokers, lawyers, bankers, government officials and academics. The club is an excellent venue for networking with the leadership and society of Santa Barbara.

The club is not affiliated with the University of California at Santa Barbara, but a university degree is required for nomination. Membership is by invitation only, and two existing members must sponsor the nominee. The Membership Committee and the Board then review the nomination. There is a maximum of 300 voting equity members, but current membership levels are somewhat lower.

The cost for a normal resident (within 25 miles of the club) voting equity member is \$3000 for the

initiation fee, with \$125 per month for the membership fee and a monthly minimum dining fee of \$75. Non-residents pay no mininum dining fee and the other costs are cut by about half. In an interesting category, ordained ministers, staff of local non-profits, and local government officials are offered an initiation fee of only \$600.
