


Vanuatu – What's That?



Vanuatu is a country in the SW Pacific, with 83 volcanic islands and 250,000 friendly people









Previously the New Hebrides, Vanuatu was the setting for *South Pacific*, and got independence in 1980 from Britain and France









With 123 languages, this is the most linguistically dense country on Earth -- but only 3% are fairly well documented

Mobile phone household penetration has increased dramatically to 94%+



Vanuatu is dominated by male chiefs, who rise in rank by killing sacred pigs

with circular tusks













Domestic violence rates very high -no female members of Parliament -women's social status is quite low



For 126 years anthropologists have stated or assumed that there are no female chiefs in Vanuatu




Codrington in 1891:

The Expedition started with a surprising lunch










Elvina Roling Baniala Toa, A Female Chief (?) of Maewo island





Our team arrived on Maewo 8/2016 to observe the Women's Festival and interview female chiefs





We documented the Maewo Women's Cultural Festival



Traditional water fights



Bird dances



Famous "water music"



Sand painting



The Festival emphasized traditions



Women in traditional pandanus leaf garments



Cooking w/ hot rocks





Males opened and closed the Festival

We learned new things about women's initiation & island traditions...



The pig-killing initiation ceremony "making Lengwasa" varies across the island



There are 3 grades of female leader, with 3 grades now lost




10-20% re-do Lengwasa later in life



Avoiding an evil spirit is not always the main reason for making Lengwasa



About 60% of island traditional culture has been lost





Capt. Sophie Hollingsworth documented via watercolors







BUT -- there was a problem...






...the Maewo women refused to be called "chiefs" – they preferred "Notari"

Female Chiefs - Where are They?



Doreen Leona and her mother, from Pentecost island, <u>ARE</u> female chiefs







Phoebe John was a chief on Pele island for four years, the only chief in her village, and...





...she had all the powers and rights of a male chief!

Hilda Lini: most senior female chief



Eleven chiefly titles



M.P. for 11 years, was Minister twice



Founded institute for the study of local barter economics and ethnology; sister of founder of Vanuatu



Won two international peace prizes



Recognized as a chief by male chiefs



Can speak in the chiefs' "nakamals"

Chief Lini said:







Killed ~25 sacred pigs in 15 ceremonies



Female chiefs have existed since pre-history



There is an "Association of Female Chiefs" in the Shepherd's Group of NW Vanuatu



Six non-Christian villages in S Pentecost have female chiefs



N Pentecost has the most female chiefs



Other key leaders agreed that female chiefs exist



P.M.'s office: "There are female chiefs, esp. in Pentecost island and PENAMA province"



Women's Affairs Dept.: "There are women chiefs on Ambae, Pentecost and Espiritu Santo"



National Council of Chiefs: "No female chiefs on current list, but when updated there may be. Female chiefs are on Ambae, with limited powers."



We estimated the total number of female chiefs...

Conclusions:




There are female chiefs now in Vanuatu; and they may have existed since pre-historic times



This is a huge paradigm shift from previous thought



Even though "chief" is a Western term, it is used in the Constitution, law, regulations, programs and society




